In 1692, the Puritan New England town of Salem, Massachusetts was seized by a wave of hysteria claiming "witchcraft." Young Abigail Williams, in a cunning move to save her own name, accuses the slave, Tituba, of seducing the village's girls into practicing witchcraft. The townspeople pray in desperation as they process this news.

On July 11, 1897, Solomon August Andrée, Nils Strindberg and Knut Frankael set out to circumnavigate the North Pole in a hydrogen balloon. Thirty-three years later, their bodies, as well as their journals, were found and returned to Sweden. The text of this letter comes from a diary entry written by Andree on his fiancée's birthday.
