MARÍA FÁTIMA CORONA DEL TORO

Conductor & Violinist



An award-winning conductor from Nayarit, Mexico, María Fátima Corona del Toro is the 2025 national recipient of The American Prize in Conducting – University/Community Opera Division. She is currently a doctoral candidate in orchestral conducting at the University of Arizona School of Music, where she studies under the mentorship of Dr. Thomas Cockrell. As a 2022–23 University Fellow, Ms. Corona has served as assistant conductor for the Arizona Symphony Orchestra, UA Opera Theater, and the Philharmonic Orchestra. Her commitment to music education is reflected in her work with the *Esperanza Azteca* social-music initiative

in Mexico, where she was the first woman to serve as conductor and artistic director, providing transformative classical music education to underserved children and youth.

Ms. Corona began her musical journey as a violinist, graduating with honors from the Universidad Autónoma de Baja California. Her conducting studies have taken her across the United States, earning a master's degree from Michigan State University. She has held assistant and guest conducting positions with a variety of ensembles, including the Jackson Symphony Orchestra, Grand Rapids Youth Symphony, and Maryland Classic Youth Orchestras.

A passionate advocate for new music as well as the classical canon, Ms. Corona has championed works by contemporary composers such as Anna Clyne, Jessie Montgomery, and Kevin Day. She has conducted orchestras across Mexico, including the Orquesta de Música Popular de la Universidad de Veracruz. In 2024, she was selected for the College Orchestra Directors Association masterclass and served as assistant conductor at Opera in the Ozarks, leading performances of Vittorio Giannini's *Beauty and the Beast* and Maurice Ravel's *L'Enfant et les Sortilèges*.

Ms. Corona will lead the Arizona Symphony Orchestra in a concert this fall and conduct *Die Fledermaus* with the Orchestra of the Universidad Autónoma de Baja California in Mexico.
